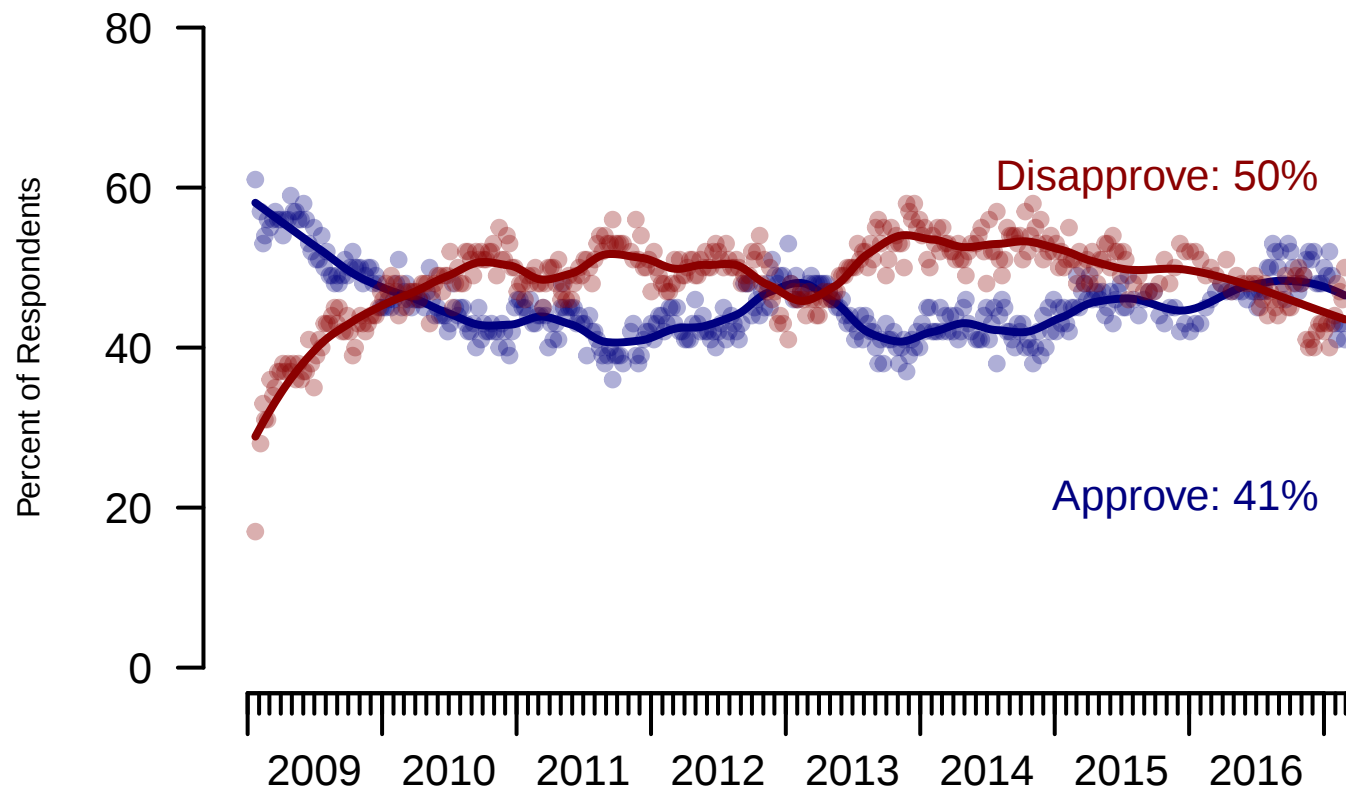


Figure 1: Presidential Approval – All Adults

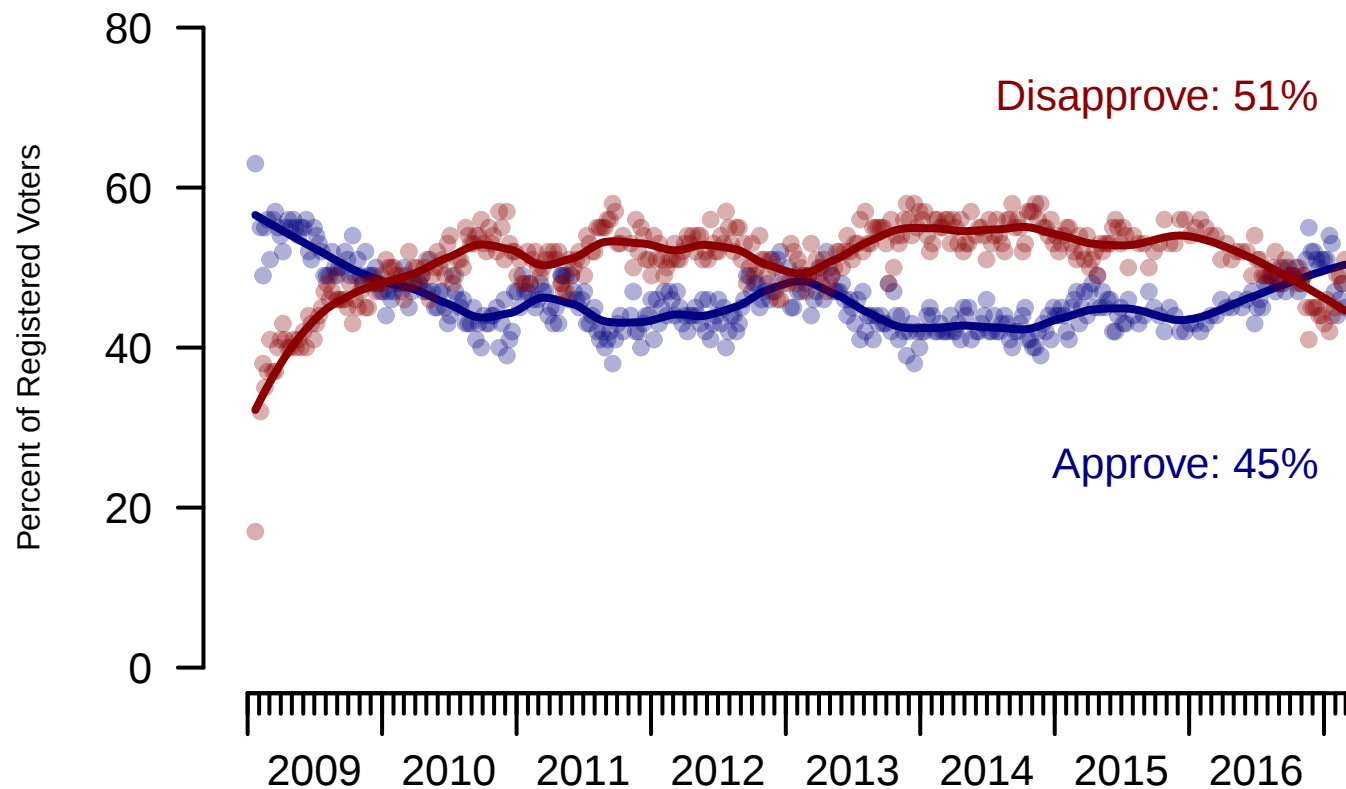


Figure 2: Presidential Approval – Registered Voters

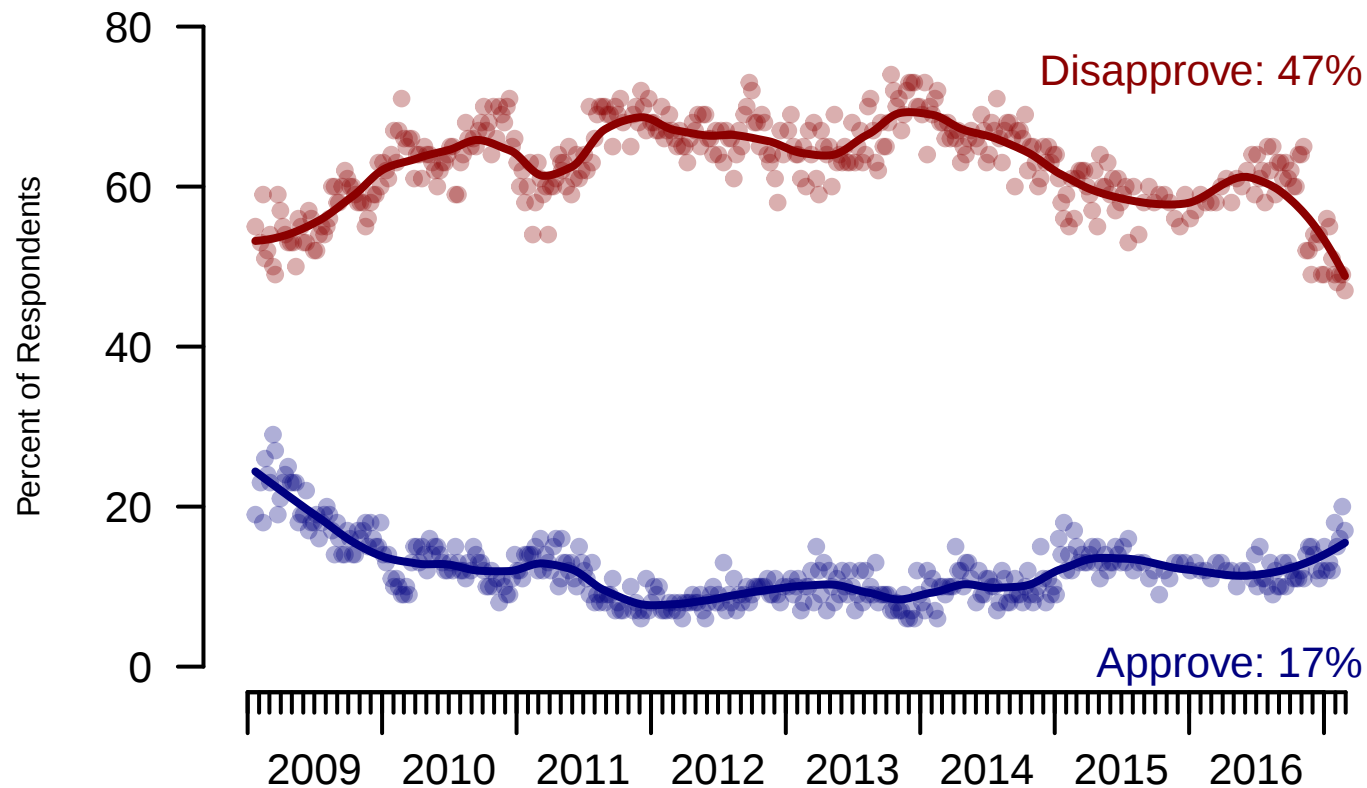


Figure 3: Congress Approval – All Adults

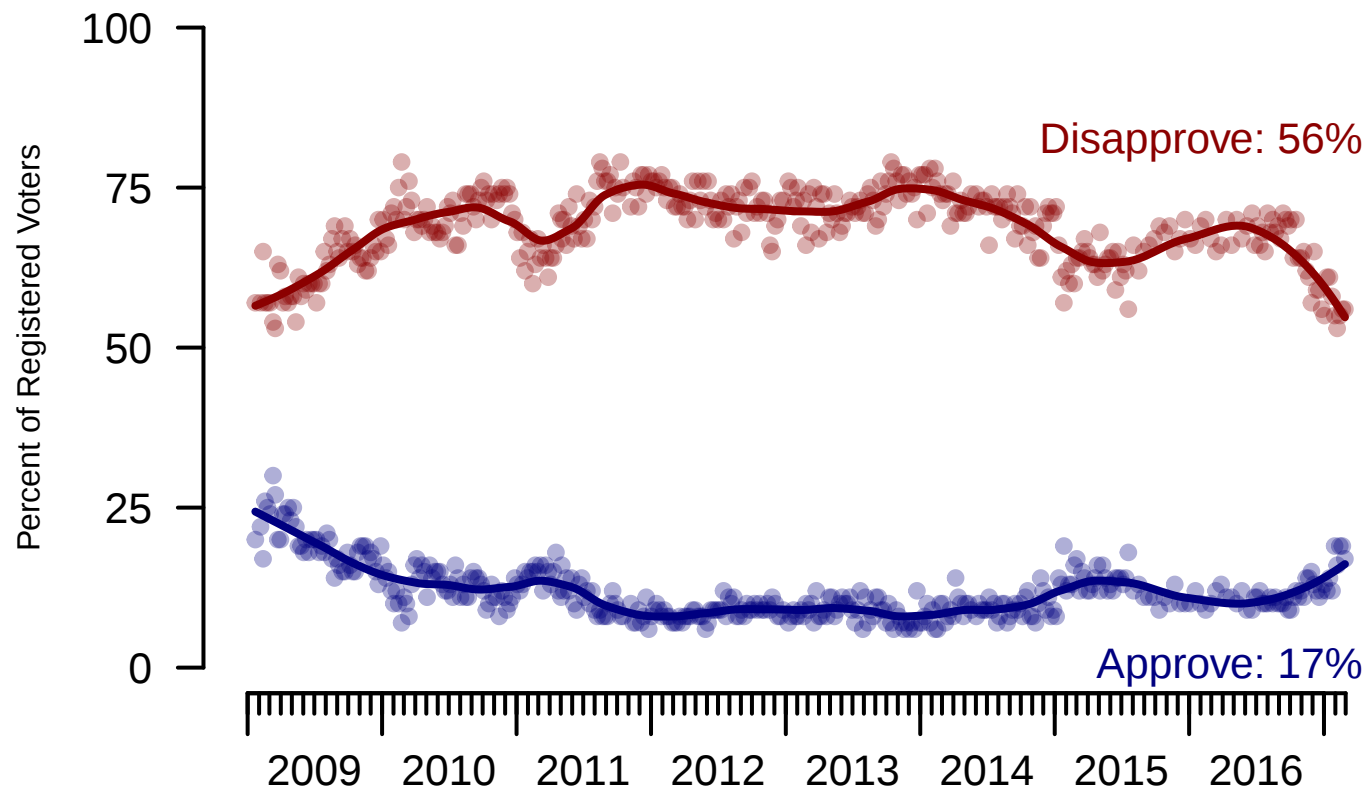


Figure 4: Congress Approval – Registered Voters

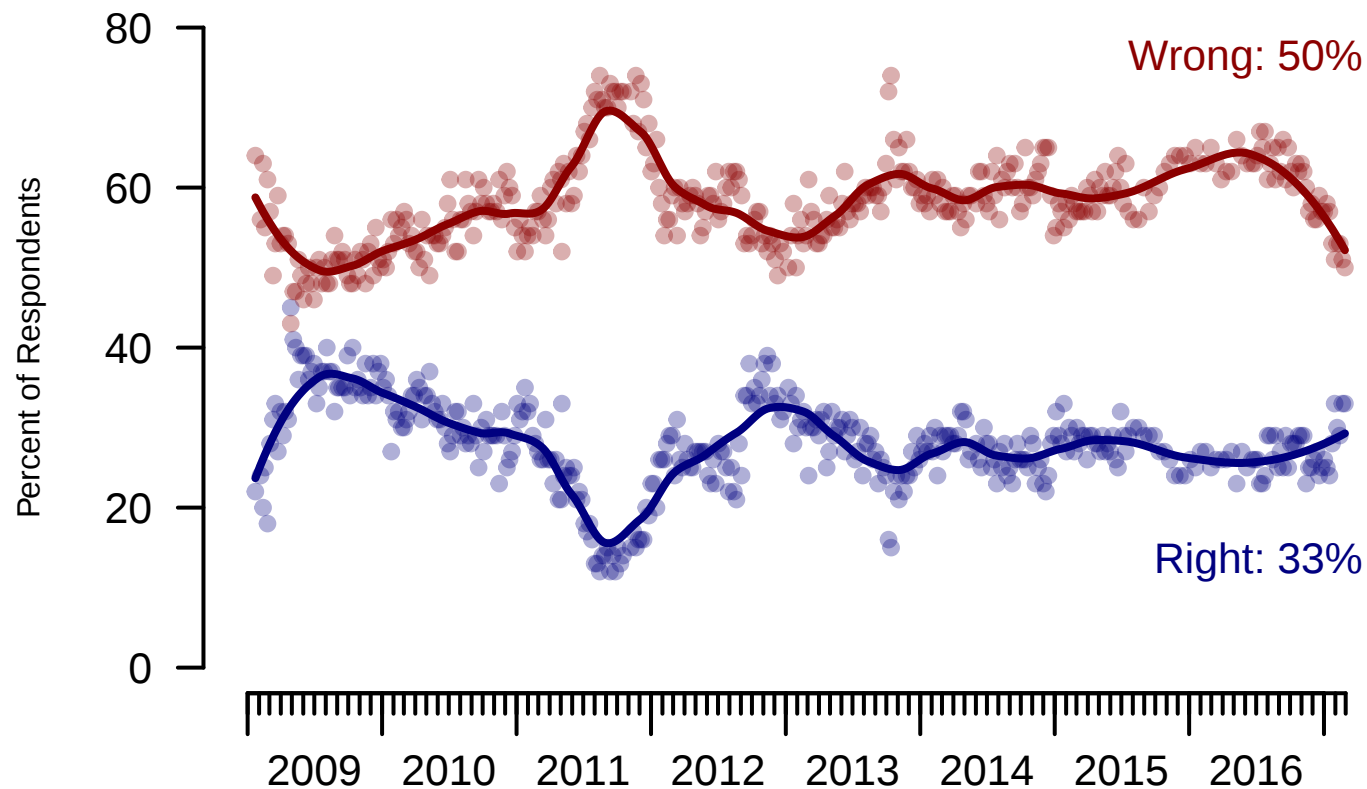


Figure 5: Direction of Country – All Adults

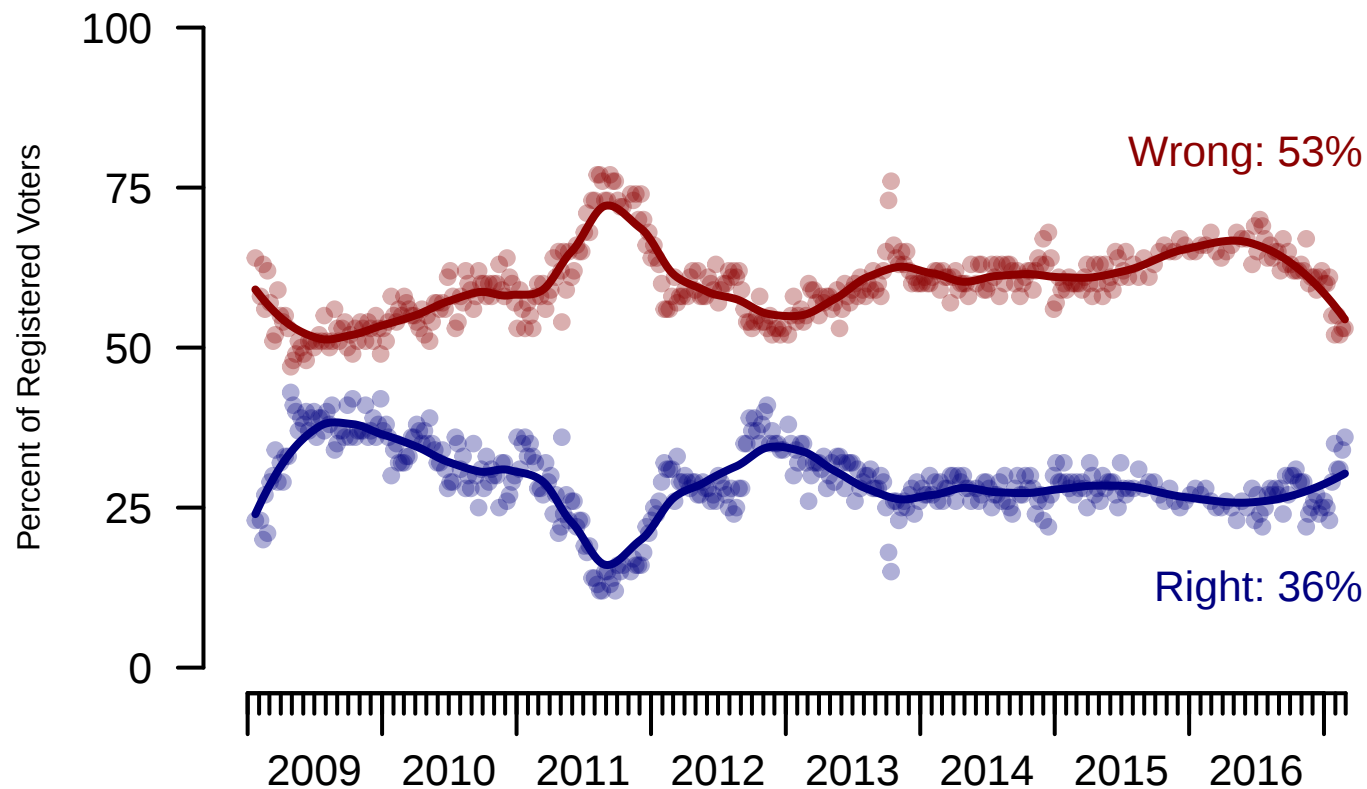


Figure 6: Direction of Country – Registered Voters

Sampling method	Respondents were selected from YouGov's opt-in Internet panel using sample matching. A random sample (stratified by age, gender, race, education, and region) was selected from the 2014 American Community Study. Voter registration was imputed from the November 2014 Current Population Survey Registration and Voting Supplement.
Weighting	The sample was weighted based on age, gender, race, education, and 2016 Presidential vote. The weights range from 0.17 to 6.26, with a mean of one and a standard deviation of 0.7.
