

## YouGov Survey Results

United States: Fieldwork conducted between 23rd - 25th May 2015. The survey was carried out online. The figures have been weighted and are representative of all adults (aged 18+). United States (n=1000).

Europe: Fieldwork conducted between 26th - 27th May 2015 as part of the monthly YouGov EuroTrack survey. The survey was carried out online. The figures have been weighted and are representative of all adults (aged 18+). Great Britain (n=1667), Germany (n=1016), France (n=1004), Denmark (n=1009), Sweden (n=1010), Finland (n=970) and Norway (n=554).

Asia-Pacific: Fieldwork conducted with YouGov panelists between 22nd May - 25th May 2015 and was weighted to be representative of adult (aged 18+) online population. Sample size: China (n=984), Singapore (n=1084), Indonesia (n=1079), Hong Kong (n=875), Malaysia (n=871), Australia (n=720), Thailand (n=1077).
