- Yes, most days 59
- Yes, at least once a week 12
 - Yes, occasionally 8
- No, I do not personally drive a car 21

How serious is traffic congestion on the roads near where you live?

- Very serious 7
- Fairly serious 36
- Not very serious 42
- Not at all serious 13
 - Don't know 2

Leaving aside how serious it is at the moment, is it becoming more serious as time goes on?

- Yes, it is **69**
- No, it isn't **22**
- Don't know 9

Which of the following do you think would be the single most effective means of reducing traffic congestion?

- Providing more buses and trains so that people would not have to rely so much on their cars 55
 - Building more roads 16
 - Charging people extra for driving on the busiest roads, especially at peak periods 9
 - Increasing sharply either fuel duty or vehicle license duty 2
 - None of these 12
 - Don't know 5

(To all except "none" and "don't know") And what would be the next most effective means of reducing congestion?

- Charging people extra for driving on the busiest roads, especially at peak periods 21
 - Building more roads 20
- Providing more buses and trains so that people would not have to rely so much on their cars 19
 - Increasing sharply either fuel duty or vehicle license duty 8
 - None of these 27
 - Don't know 5



Here are a number of things people say would happen if motorists were charged extra for driving on busy roads at peak periods. Please indicate for each whether you thing it would, or would not, be likely to happen.

Congestion on the roads would be significantly reduced

- Yes, it would probably happen 36
- No, it probably wouldn't happen 56
 - Don't know 8

Details of who had been charged extra, and for what, would be leaked to people who should not have access to that information

- Yes, it would probably happen 55
- No, it probably wouldn't happen 23
 - Don't know 22

Many more people would use buses and trains instead of driving their car

- Yes, it would probably happen 33
- No, it probably wouldn't happen 55
 - Don't know 12

The government would greatly reduce fuel duty and/or vehicle license duty

- Yes, it would probably happen **7**
- No, it probably wouldn't happen 84
 - Don't know 9

The amount of pollution caused by cars and other motor vehicles would be cut significantly

- Yes, it would probably happen 27
- No, it probably wouldn't happen 60
 - Don't know 13

A lot of motorists would be charged wrongly for distances they had not actually driven

- Yes, it would probably happen 67
- No, it probably wouldn't happen 16
 - Don't know 17

Fewer new roads would be built

- Yes, it would probably happen 60
- No, it probably wouldn't happen 21
 - Don't know 19



Any reduction in congestion on busy roads would lead only to increased congestion on roads that are now not so busy

If the present Government or some future Government does introduce a pay-asyou-drive scheme, which of the following would you prefer – assuming that the total amount of money raised by the two schemes is the same?

- Cameras or other tracking devices located only on the busiest roads and only charging drivers for using those roads, perhaps only at peak times 55
 - A system for tracking all motor vehicles at all times, with charges related to the roads along which they are driven and the times at which they are driven
 - Don't know 27



There is a suggestion that heavy lorries should be charged more than cars. Do you think that, if a scheme of road pricing is introduced, heavy lorries should, or should not, be charged more than cars?

- Yes, heavy lorries should be charged more 62
 - No, they should not 29
 - Don't know 9

There is also a suggestion that cars that are 'gas guzzlers' should be charged more than cars that consume less fuel. Do you think that, if a scheme of road pricing is introduced, gas guzzlers should, or should not, be charged more than cars that use less

- Yes, gas guzzlers should be charged more **68**
 - No, they should not 26
 - Don't know 6

The present Government gives the impression of wanting to introduce some form of road pricing. Why do you think it wants to do that?

- It wants to reduce congestion and pollution 12
 - It wants to raise additional revenue 48
 - It wants both 36
 - Don't know 4

Suppose some way could be found to guarantee that ALL the money raised was used to improve public transport and to reduce the cost of the road fund licence ('tax disc'), would you support or oppose the introduction of 'pay-as-you-drive-motoring'?

- Support 54
- Oppose 24

Whichever party is in power, do you think the introduction of some form of road pricing is inevitable? In other words, is it going to happen sooner or later whether we like it or not?
