Some people say that in recent years UK universities have been 'chronically underfunded'. From what you know, do you believe they have, or have not, been chronically underfunded?

- Yes, they have been 44
 - No, they have not **31**
 - Don't know 26

If extra money is put into universities, should all the extra money come out of general tax revenues, or should those who go to university make some contribution, at the time or later, to the cost of their university course?

- Should come out of general taxation 29
- Students should make some contribution **65**
 - Don't know 6

If those who go to university are required to contribute to the cost of their course, what form should their contribution take?

- Fees paid 'up front' at the beginning of every academic year 9
- Fees repaid over a period of years after students have graduated and are earning a salary 44
- No fees, but an additional tax levied on all students after they have graduated, with the money raised in this way going to universities **38**

At the moment, a typical student pays £1,100 a year in tuition fees 'up front', and borrows money to live on. As a result, graduates today typically leave university with debts of around £10,000.
